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## Home Affairs

### House of Commons Written Answers

#### Census: Ethnic Groups

**Preet Kaur Gill (Labour Co-op) [211331]** To ask the Minister for the Cabinet Office, what assessment he has made of the effect on the quality of information provided by having a write-in option compared to a tick box option for ethnicity in the Census in terms of public bodies monitoring ethnic groups.

**Chloe Smith:** The information requested falls within the responsibility of the UK Statistics Authority. I have asked the Authority to reply. ...

On Friday 14 December 2018 the Government published a White Paper 'Help Shape Our Future: The 2021 Census of Population and Housing in England and Wales'<sup>1</sup> laying out the UK Statistics Authority's proposals for the conduct and content of the 2021 Census. In May 2016, the Office for National Statistics (ONS) published the criteria<sup>2</sup> used for assessing the content of the census and this includes data quality, along with other criteria including user needs, legal obligations and operational requirements.

The White Paper includes ONS's recommendations, which fully recognise the need for robust, accurate data on the ethnic group category. The recommendations for the ethnic group are set out in Section 3 of the White Paper. Sections 3.182 to 3.184 may be of interest, as these set out improvements for equalities monitoring following the census:

*3.182 In 2017 the government online data service "Ethnicity Facts and Figures", published by the Race Disparity Unit, showed that data collections on ethnic group across the public sector are not consistent. In addition, religion is little monitored across government. ONS recognises that for communities including the Sikh, Jewish and Roma communities this means many aspects of their communities' needs are hidden at present and that this needs to change. <https://www.ethnicity-facts-figures.service.gov.uk>*

*3.183 As well as the consideration ONS has given to how this can be addressed in the census, ONS will use the new possibilities provided by the Digital Economy Act 2017 to address these needs. ONS will work across government to identify a body*

that collects data on each key characteristic so that once collected the data can be shared with ONS and used with other data to improve the government's ability to identify and address disadvantage associated with each of the protected characteristics across government, consistently, at lower cost to the taxpayer, and lower burden on users of public services.

3.184 In advance of this the harmonisation guidance will be updated as soon as possible to ensure that it fully reflects the range of communities that need to be monitored as a race.

You may also like to consider both ONS's and the Government's responses<sup>3</sup> to the Women and Equalities Select Committee Race Disparity Audit report, and the Committee's recommendations with regards to improving the collection and availability of data by ethnicity across the public sector.

### Offences against Children

**Emma Reynolds (Labour)** [211716] To ask the Secretary of State for Justice, whether he has made an assessment of the potential merits of extending the provisions of sections 16 to 24 of the Sexual Offences Act 2003 to include (a) sports coaches, (b) driving instructors, (c) faith leaders and (d) other positions of trust; and if he will make a statement.

**Lucy Frazer:** Any sexual activity with a child under 16 is a criminal offence, regardless of whether consent is given. Any non-consensual sexual activity is also a crime, whatever the age of the victim and whatever the relationship between the victim and perpetrator.

Where a manipulative offender grooms a child prior to them reaching the age of consent and then engages in a sexual relationship with them when they are over 16, this could be prosecuted under offences such as Section 15A of the Sexual Offences Act 2003.

We remain absolutely committed to protecting children and young people from sexual abuse and we already have a wide range of criminal offences under which to prosecute and sentence those who carry out such acts. We continue to keep this under review.

## House of Lords Written Answers

### Government Departments: Religious Freedom

**Lord Alton of Liverpool (Crossbench)** [HL13051] To ask Her Majesty's Government whether they will encourage departments, including the Ministry of Defence and the Department for International Development, to make freedom of religion or belief literacy

training available for their staff; and whether they will produce strategies which show how they aim to promote freedom of religion or belief.

**Lord Young of Cookham:** The Civil Service Diversity & Inclusion Strategy makes clear our commitment to addressing issues of faith and belief as part of our wider approach to inclusion. The strategy also makes clear our commitment to working with all government departments to achieve this goal.

We have a Civil Service Faith and Belief Champion in place (Clare Moriarty, Permanent Secretary DEFRA), and Faith and Belief departmental Champions in 26 departments (across Whitehall and agencies - including the Ministry of Defence and the Department for International Development), tasked with promoting faith literacy and inclusion in their departments.

The Champions and networks across Government have agreed a narrative that will underpin our work towards greater faith literacy.

Faith and Belief training is currently being developed for use by line managers, Champions and networks to support more inclusive environments for faith and belief in the Civil Service.

**Lord Pearson of Rannoch (UKIP) [HL12902]** To ask Her Majesty's Government what assessment they have made of the report by the All-Party Parliamentary Group on British Muslims Islamophobia defined: the inquiry into a working definition of Islamophobia, published in November 2018; and what assessment they have made of whether the evidence that was used in that report was balanced and objective.

**Lord Bourne of Aberystwyth:** We are aware that some have suggested that establishing a definition of Islamophobia could strengthen efforts to confront bigotry and division. We are examining the options for an agreed definition of Islamophobia and intend to develop this through the Anti-Muslim Hatred Working Group.

## **Charity Commission**

### **New Charity Inquiry: The Bersam Trust**

The Charity Commission ... has opened a statutory inquiry into The Bersam Trust ([526452](#)) to look into concerns over potential misconduct and mismanagement in the administration of the charity. ...

The charity, which operates from the Salford area, has objects which include providing children with a strictly orthodox Jewish religious education and advancing orthodox Jewish practice.

The Commission has examined the charity's annual accounts and obtained records from the charity's bank account under section 52 of the Charities Act 2011. It found significant discrepancies between the financial activity recorded in the accounts and the values of funds entering and leaving the charity's bank accounts, raising serious concern.

The Commission's accountancy analysis also identified that comparative figures in the accounts do not match those in the previous year's accounts and differences are not supported by explanation from the Independent Examiner.

The Commission has therefore taken protective regulatory action to freeze the charity's bank accounts, under section 76(3)(d) of the Charities Act 2011. ...

The Commission previously engaged with the charity in respect of regulatory concerns regarding governance issues, and provided regulatory advice and guidance to the trustees

in the form of an action plan. The inquiry will also examine the extent to which the trustees have complied with previously issued regulatory guidance. ...

### House of Commons Oral Answer

#### Prime Minister's Questions

**Bob Blackman (Conservative):** Last Sunday, we commemorated Holocaust Memorial Day, when we remembered the darkest period in Europe's history. Will my right hon. Friend join me in thanking the Holocaust Educational Trust, its youth ambassadors, and the incredible survivors, who give their personal testimony to young people so that they will remember what the ultimate destination of racial hatred and antisemitism truly is?

**The Prime Minister:** My hon. Friend is absolutely right to raise the excellent work that the Holocaust Educational Trust does, and the youth ambassadors. I have met some of these youth ambassadors, who have understood the importance of learning the lesson from the holocaust, and understood the importance of acting against antisemitism wherever it occurs—and, indeed, wider racial hatred. As my hon. Friend says, the survivors from the holocaust have given their time to ensuring that nobody is in any doubt about where man's inhumanity to man can lead. They have done a really important job. I pay tribute to them and to their continuing work. It is important that we all recognise the terrible things that can happen when we let antisemitism occur. We should all be fighting against antisemitism wherever it occurs.

### Scottish Parliament Time for Reflection

#### Time for Reflection

**Brogan Carberry (Lessons from Auschwitz Ambassador, Holocaust Educational Trust):** In October 2018, Zaina and I took part in the lessons from Auschwitz project with the Holocaust Educational Trust. ...

The experience was a massive learning curve. We learned how extremely fragile human life is, and our understanding of the Holocaust was challenged. Although we know that the Holocaust was the systematic killing of 6 million Jews, we began to understand that the Holocaust is not just about statistics but about the individuals behind that number, who had families, goals and aspirations.

Standing at Auschwitz, where so many were murdered, was an extremely emotional experience. When I arrived and saw all of the hair, shoes and personal belongings that were taken from the Jews upon arrival, it really shocked me. One item in particular stood out—a set of house keys. Those keys symbolised the hope of the owner who, on the day they were forced from their home, would have locked their door in the belief that someday they would return. Unfortunately, they never did.

**Zaina Bouazza (Lessons from Auschwitz Ambassador, Holocaust Educational Trust):** Last year, our school was privileged to have Holocaust survivor Harry Bibring visit and share his experience of escaping Nazi persecution in Vienna. He came to Britain from

his home in Vienna on the Kindertransport. We learned so much from him, despite our age difference. ...

Harry Bibring remains positive, despite what he went through. He said to us, "The only race is the human race." His words stayed with me. On the anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz, I would like you all to consider Harry's words. The Holocaust must never be forgotten and the victims deserve to be remembered. ...

We must all stand up to antisemitism, racism and intolerance wherever we see it, because we know where it can lead.

## European Parliament

### **Parliament commemorates the victims of the Holocaust**

To honour International Holocaust Remembrance Day (27 January), MEPs held a formal ceremony on Wednesday and observed a minute of silence for the victims.

Opening the ceremony, President Antonio Tajani said: "By commemorating the victims of the Shoah for the first time during a plenary session as part of Parliament's Holocaust Remembrance Day ceremony, we want to send out a strong message: we must not forget and the European Parliament will never forget. There is no place in the European Union for hatred and antisemitism".

In her address to MEPs, Charlotte Knobloch, former President of the Central Council of Jews in Germany said that even though post-war European democracies have turned out to be robust, "a Europe in which 89 percent of the Jewish population complains about an increase in antisemitism in their home country has got a problem".

"We are witnessing everywhere in Europe the strengthening of political movements that are resolutely opposed to remembrance and memory. What they propagate is a present without a past, as a springboard to a future without memory."

She continued: "Hatred against Jews poisons society as a whole. It mocks the basic European belief that freedom and security is for every single European citizen, or else, for no one. It is our duty to oppose this widespread antisemitism and to push back. That is our responsibility." ...

## United Nations

### **United Nations to Hold Briefing at Headquarters on Rescue of Jews in Albania during Holocaust, 31 January**

The United Nations Department of Global Communications will hold a multimedia briefing for civil society at the United Nations on Albania's response to the plight of Jewish people during the Holocaust. ...

Hiding Jewish people saved them from deportation, and an almost-certain death during the Second World War. Rescuers in Albania made the brave choice to help in full knowledge of the grave consequences they, their families and community would face should they have been found helping Jewish people. The local Albanian population continued to give sanctuary to their fellow Jewish citizens and Jewish refugees after the occupation of Albania by the Nazis in 1943.

Recognizing Albania's response as an example of moral courage is an important aspect of Holocaust education and commemoration. The Albanian response embodies the

principles of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, that “every human being has the inalienable right to be treated with dignity and afforded the right to a life that is peaceful and just”. ...

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## Israel

### House of Commons Written Answers

#### Israel: Malaysia

**Douglas Ross (Conservative)** [211363] To ask the Secretary of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs, what representations he has made to the Malaysian Government on the Malaysian Prime Minister's (a) comments on the State of Israel of the Jewish people and (b) decision to ban Israeli swimmers from participating in sporting events in that country; and if he will make a statement.

**Mark Field:** We are aware of comments made by the Malaysian Prime Minister on the State of Israel and the Jewish people. The UK fully supports the modern State of Israel as a Jewish homeland and remain committed to the objective of sovereign and prosperous Palestinian state.

We do not agree with Malaysian Government's position on the banning of Israeli athletes. We believe it is fundamentally wrong. Israeli athletes should not be banned from competing. The UK government strongly supports the principle of inclusiveness of the Olympic movement.

We consider it right that the recent International Paralympic Committee (IPC) has decided to strip Malaysia of the right to host the tournament. The Championships must be open to all eligible athletes and nations to compete safely and free from discrimination. The committee is now seeking to find a new venue for the event.

I raised our concerns with the Malaysian Minister for Education, Dr Maszlee bin Malik on the 22 January. The British High Commissioner in Kuala Lumpur has done likewise with the Malaysian Foreign Minister. We will continue to raise our strong objection with the Malaysian authorities.

### **Right to education deeply impacted by ongoing interference in schools: Joint statement by the Humanitarian Coordinator, Jamie McGoldrick, UNICEF Special Representative, Genevieve Boutin, and UNESCO**

As the second school term resumes in the State of Palestine, we remain deeply concerned by the high number of reported incidents of interference in or near schools in the West Bank since the beginning of the school year. These incidents are impacting children's safe access to education. Incidents of interference in schools by Israeli Forces, demolitions, threats of demolition, clashes on the way to school between students and security forces, teachers stopped at checkpoints, and the violent actions of Israeli forces and settlers on some occasions, are impacting access to a safe learning environment and the right to quality education for thousands of Palestinian children.

From January to December 2018, the UN documented 111 interferences to education in the West Bank affecting 19,196 children, an average of more than two violations every week. More than half of the verified incidents involved live ammunition, tear gas, and stun grenades fired into or near schools by Israeli Forces, impacting the delivery of education or injuring students. Nearly two-thirds of all verified interference incidents in West Bank schools took place in the last four months of 2018.

Currently, some 50 schools in the West Bank, including in East Jerusalem, are under threat of demolition. In 2018, five schools in the West Bank were demolished or seized by Israeli authorities, including Izbiq Community School north of Nablus, Al Semeye School south of Hebron, and the Abu Nuwar and Jabel Baba schools in East Jerusalem. Also, since mid-October 2018, the Sawiya al Luban school south of Nablus was closed for a day, and the Khan al-Ahmar village school, east of Jerusalem, remains under threat of demolition, along with the rest of the village. Orief secondary school for boys near Nablus has also been forced closed twice due to settler violence, and children from this school have been hospitalized with multiple injuries, including from gunshots. In the H2 area of Hebron, tear gas is regularly used around schools, and new measures are being applied at checkpoints that expose students and teachers to violence - at one particularly affected H2 school, more than 20 such incidents were documented in 2018.

Moreover, during military escalations from 11 to 13 November, schools in Gaza and in southern Israel were closed for at least one day, including four schools in Gaza that received minor damage, and one learning support centre and one kindergarten that both severely damaged.

Schools should be respected as places of learning, safety and stability. The classroom should be a sanctuary from conflict, where children can learn and develop into active citizens.

Children should never be the target of violence and must not be exposed to any form of violence.

## UN Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights

### **Global action needed on growing Israeli settlement moves, says UN rights expert**

The international community must take decisive action in response to Israel's recent intensification of settlement activities in the occupied West Bank, including East Jerusalem, which amounts to a clear rebuff of a two-state solution, says a UN human rights expert.

"If these further settlements steps by Israel are left unanswered by the international community, we will be driving past the last exit on the road to annexation," said the Special Rapporteur for the situation of human rights in the Palestinian territory occupied since 1967, Michael Lynk.

"The global community has repeatedly affirmed that the Israeli settlements are a flagrant violation of the Fourth Geneva Convention of 1949. The settlements are also a presumptive war crime under the 1998 Statute of Rome, and as I have noted many times before, settlements are the source of a range of persistent human rights violations," said the UN expert.

The last year has seen a marked rise in incidents of violence by Israeli settlers against Palestinians in the West Bank. "In many cases, Israeli forces, obligated to protect the Palestinian population under international humanitarian law, stand idly by while olive trees are destroyed, livelihoods are damaged, and even while people are injured or, at worst, killed. The events in the West Bank village of Al Mughayyir on 26 January are a sobering example of this extremely troubling phenomenon, where a Palestinian villager was shot dead in the presence of Israeli settlers and soldiers. These incidents not only violate numerous human rights such as the rights to life, security of the person, and freedom of movement of Palestinians, but also serve to expand the area of land over which Israeli settlers have control," Mr. Lynk observed.

"It is impossible to square the international community's rhetorical support for a genuine two-state solution with its persistent unwillingness to confront Israel with any meaningful injunctions to halt and reverse these steps towards annexation.

"The Israeli settlements are the engine of the 51-year long occupation. This occupation will not die of old age, but only with the resolute imposition of consequences on Israel for ignoring international law and numerous United Nations resolutions," Mr. Lynk added.

The Special Rapporteur also highlighted that, on 8 January, Israel opened Route 4370, which links Jerusalem to the settlements north and east of the city. Dubbed the "apartheid road" by the Israeli newspaper Ha'aretz, it consists of two parallel roads – one for Israelis and the other for Palestinians in the West Bank – with a dividing wall between them.

Route 4370 is an integral part of the two-tier network of segregated highways in the occupied West Bank in support of the settlements. "I agree with human rights defenders who have pointed out that the road is part of Israel's long-term strategy to ensure contiguity between Jerusalem and surrounding settlements, and to consolidate Israel's claim for sovereignty over Area C, which covers 60 percent of the West Bank." ...

#### Foreign and Commonwealth Office: Religion

**Jeremy Lefroy (Conservative)** [210584] To ask the Secretary of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs, how many and what proportion of staff of his Department have undertaken the course on religious literacy run by his Department's Diplomatic Academy.

**Alan Duncan:** Religion and diplomacy is included in the Foreign & Commonwealth Office (FCO) Diplomatic Academy's training module on human rights. So far 181 staff have completed this module, which is mandatory for staff on the FCO fast stream induction programme.

The diplomatic academy is not the only way in which staff obtain and expand their religious literacy. The FCO offers a more in-depth two day course on religion and diplomacy. This course, which takes place twice-yearly is attended by 30 to 40 students. The FCO also runs seminars or talks on specific themes or religions. These are open to all staff.

**Alan Duncan:** There are no posts for which pre-posting training in religion and diplomacy is mandatory. However, Foundation Level online learning on Religion and Diplomacy is a mandatory component of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office's (FCO) fast stream induction programme. In addition, the FCO course on religion and diplomacy delivered by the London School of Economics is well advertised throughout the FCO and we actively encourage attendance by staff if their job relates to countries in which religion plays a significant part in social and political life.
